Jobs Crisis and the Great Recession

(Note that all numbers are current as of January 8, 2010. States numbers are current as of January 22, 2010.)

THE JOBS CRISIS

- Number unemployed: **15.3 million** (up from 7.5 million in December 2007)
- Portion of unemployed who have been jobless more than six months: 39.8%
- Total jobs lost during the recession: **8.1 million**
- Jobs lost in December 2009: **85,000**
- Jobs needed to return to pre-recession unemployment rate: 10.6 million
- Number of jobseekers per job opening: 6.4
- Unemployment rate: 10.0%
- States with double-digit unemployment in December, 2009: 17
- White unemployment: 9.0%; black unemployment: 16.2%; Hispanic unemployment: 12.9%
- Manufacturing jobs lost since the start of the recession: 2.1 million (15.6% of that sector's jobs)*
- Construction jobs lost in the recession: 1.6 million (21.5%, about one in five construction jobs)*
- Mass layoffs (50 or more people by a single employer) in November 2009: 1,797; jobs lost: 165,346
- Number of workers who have dropped out of the labor force since December, 2007: roughly 3.6 million
- Underemployment rate: 17.3%; share of workers un- or underemployed: more than 1 in 6
- Under- and unemployed, marginally attached and involuntary part-time workers: 27 million

HARDSHIPS AND THE SAFETY NET

- Americans with no health insurance in 2008: 46.3 million
- Drop in children covered through parents' employers, 2000 to 2007: 3.4 million
- Annual Social Security benefit for average retiree: \$13,922; share of older Americans receiving all their income from Social Security: more than 1 out of 4
- Number of children in poverty in 2008: **14.1 million** (over one-third)
- Drop in real median income from 2007 to 2008: **3.6**% (largest one-year drop since 1967)
- Annualized growth rate of nominal, hourly wages of production workers over the last three months: 2.6%
- Additional people covered by Medicaid/SCHIP in 2008: 3 million

AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT

- Average weekly unemployment benefit in November (including additional \$25 per week from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act): \$334
- Number of additional people each week receiving unemployment compensation because of ARRA in December: 5.1 million
- Average monthly cost of COBRA with American Recovery and Reinvestment Act subsidy: \$370;
 Without American Recovery and Reinvestment Act subsidy: \$1,057
