Inequality Grew More in Connecticut Than in Any Other State

Connecticut's Richest Families vs. Poorest Families

- The *richest* 20 percent of families have average incomes **8.0** times as large as the *poorest* 20 percent of families.
- This ratio was **4.6** in the late 1980s.
- This growth in income inequality is **largest** in the nation.
- The very richest families — top 5% — have average incomes **14.8** times as large as the poorest 20 percent of families.

The gap between Connecticut's richest and poorest families is
7th
largest in the nation.

Connecticut's Richest Families vs. Families in the Middle

- The *richest* 20 percent of families have average incomes **2.7** times as large as the *middle* 20 percent of families.
- This ratio was **1.9** in the late 1980s.
- This growth in income inequality is **largest** in the nation.

The gap between Connecticut's richest families and families in the middle is
12th
largest in the nation.

A Closer Look: Short- and Long-term Trends

Late 1990s to mid-2000s

- The average income of the *poorest* fifth of families did not change significantly.
- The average income of the *middle* fifth of families did not change significantly.
- The average income of the *richest* fifth of families increased by **\$20,653**, from \$148,725 to \$169,378.

Late 1980s to mid-2000s

- The average income of the *poorest* fifth of families decreased by **\$4,437**, from \$25,570 to \$21,133.
- The average income of the *middle* fifth of families did not change significantly.
- The average income of the *richest* fifth of families increased by **\$52,439**, from \$116,939 to \$169,378.
