Data Coverage

- Data to be released on September 10 will be for 2008
 - Here's last year's report title:

Income, Poverty, and Health
Insurance Coverage in the
United States: 2007
Issued August 2008

- The economy has deteriorated significantly since then.
 - Current situation is worse than this report will show



Overall


- In the 2008 report (to be released on the 10th)
 - Poverty will likely rise slightly
 - Median incomes likely to stagnate (and may fall)
 - Low inflation in 2008 (esp. at the end) may stem inflationadjusted losses
 - Number of uninsured will almost certainly increase

- However, this will understate the deterioration in incomes and poverty since then:
 - the economic downturn has accelerated since '08.




Unemployment

- In 2008, unemployment averaged 5.8%.
- This year (so far) unemployment has averaged
 8.8%






Unemployment rate 2006-2009





Wage growth declines





No-so-wild speculation

- The poverty and income numbers will be worse than 2007.
 - Downturn widespread; so too will be the impact across race, ethnic, gender, age groups.
 - Children, certain racial groups always hit harder (see below).




Looking into 2009-10

- Higher unemployment
- Wage stagnation
 - (and real wage declines in 09)
 - Inflation low in 08, but picked up since then
- Long-term unemployed (6+ months) at highest level in 70 years.
- Underemployment growing




Unemployment will keep rising








Unemployment: Mid-2010













High Unemployment Rate Raises Poverty

	2007 Poverty rate	Poverty rate as result of 10% unemployment (2010 or later)
All	12.5%	14.8%
Adults (18-64)	10.9	14.5
All Children	18.0	27.3
Single Mothers	37.0	48.3
Blacks	24.5	33.3
Hispanics	21.5	>21.5
Black Children	34.5	52.3



Bottom line

 Report will likely show some modest deterioration for 2008, but ...

- The economic contraction really picked up steam in late 2008, and early 2009.
- We can expect continued struggles through 2010 and beyond.
